

The Ohio River Basin Alliance (ORBA) is collaborating with National Wildlife Federation, Ohio River Valley Water Sanitation Commission (ORSANCO), U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Great Lakes and Ohio River Division, and other local, state, and regional partners throughout the Ohio River Basin to craft a bold plan to restore and protect the waters of the Ohio River region, which includes Alabama, Georgia, Kentucky, Illinois, Indiana, Maryland, Mississippi, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, Virginia and West Virginia. ORBA's restoration plan seeks to address health-threatening pollution, reverse environmental injustices, and promote strong local economies. Environmental justice is important because it:

- Ensures everyone has clean air and water.
- Allows people to live healthier lives.
- Protects individuals from harmful exposure to toxins and pollution.
- Helps congress establish legislation improving sanitation conditions and access to resources.
- Ensures that nobody gets left behind when addressing the climate crisis.
- Protects people from being made victims of the plans and ambitions of others.



In order to enhance the quality of life and overcome the historical environmental and health-related challenges faced by low-income and underserved communities primarily consisting of African Americans and people of color, it is imperative that individuals possess knowledge and understanding. These challenges, which have been perpetuated by generations of family poverty and difficult choices surrounding employment, housing, food, and transportation, have contributed to social justice issues that must be addressed. The ability to surmount these challenges is crucial for success both on a national scale and within local communities
